Council met in regular session with Mayor Gettys, Mayor Pro Tem Pender and Councilmembers Black, Jackson, Lindsay, Reno, and Sutton. Upon a motion by Councilmember Pender, which was duly seconded and approved upon a vote of 6-1, with Councilmember Sutton dissenting, approved Planning Commission recommendation regarding Petition M-2021-16 by Greenway Residential Development LLC (Mark Richardson) to rezone approximately 12.4 acres at 805 Heckle Boulevard and adjacent right-of-way from Neighborhood Commercial (NC) and Single-Family Residential-5 (SF-5) to Multi-Family Residential (MFR). Tax Parcel 597-04-01-051.

The applicant requested rezoning in order to facilitate the development of affordable, multi-family apartments on the property. The development is being submitted for tax credit funding as a family development. The conceptual site plan shows eight buildings with 156 total units. The rents and tenant incomes will be restricted at 60% of the Area Median Income (AMI) for all units. The Planning Commission recommended approval of the rezoning at their April meeting by a vote of 6-0 (Christopher absent). This item was first considered by the City Council at the April 26, 2021 meeting and there have been no changes since then.

Dennis Fields, Planner III, presented the item to the City Council.

APPROVED A RESOLUTION FOR THE EXCHANGE AT ROCK HILL TEXTILE MILL SITE UNDER THE SOUTH CAROLINA TEXTILES COMMUNITIES REVITALIZATION ACT

Upon a motion by Councilmember Sutton, which was duly seconded and unanimously approved, approved a resolution for The Exchange at Rock Hill Textile Mill Site under the South Carolina Textiles Communities Revitalization Act.

This resolution enables certain tax credit options for property located near the Cotton Factory. The Developer has requested this approval to comply with certification requirements set forth in the Textile Mill Statute. This resolution tracks similar approvals by City Council. The City Attorney recommended approval.

Paul Dillingham, City Attorney, presented the item to the City Council.

APPROVED DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF ROCK HILL AND 302 DAVE LYLE, LLC

Upon a motion by Councilmember Pender, which was duly seconded and unanimously approved, approved a development agreement between the City of Rock Hill and 302 Dave Lyle, LLC.

The Developer will be investing at least \$1M into the Cotton Warehouse redevelopment for 5,000 square feet of commercial space. Proposed City support includes the extension of a pedestrian walkway and the closure of an alleyway for future shared parking. The City Attorney recommended approval.

Paul Dillingham, City Attorney, presented the item to the City Council.

APPROVED PUBLIC PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION REGARDING MEMBERSHIP FEE INCREASES FOR THE TENNIS CENTER

Upon a motion by Councilmember Reno to approve the Recreation Commission's recommendation presented at the May 10, 2021 budget work session plus a \$25 annual upcharge to out of County members, which was duly seconded and approved upon a vote of 5-2, with Councilmembers Black and Sutton dissenting, approved Public Parks and Recreation Commission recommendation regarding membership fee increases for the Tennis Center.

The Rock Hill Tennis Center member fees are no longer in line with current market pricing. The Parks and Recreation Commission's recommendation to the following membership rates will be effective July 1, 2021: Adult \$250; Family \$375; Senior Family \$225; Senior \$125; Youth \$100. An additional \$25 upcharge will be added to membership rates for those living outside of York County.

John Taylor, Parks Recreation and Tourism Director, presented the item to the City Council.

ANNOUNCED SMARTSWITCH WINNER

This month's SmartSwitch winner, chosen at random by computer, is Anita Glover. This customer will receive a \$100 credit on their next utility bill.

CITY COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS

There were no City Council committee reports.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Councilmember Jackson expressed her condolences to the family of Addelene Austin, an individual that was instrumental during the Civil Rights movement in the history of Rock Hill.

Councilmember Sutton made a motion to reconsider Tennis Fees, which received no second. Councilmember Sutton then requested that the Tennis Center maintain records on the number of times a member plays at the Tennis Center, as well as where they reside. Councilmember Pender expressed that if this is required for the Tennis Center, it should be done for all of the City's recreation centers.

Mayor Gettys reminded the public that a Food Truck Friday event will be held June 18, 2021 as part of the Juneteenth celebration.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Upon a motion by Councilmember Reno, which was duly seconded and unanimously approved, the Mayor and Council went into Executive Session to discuss six matters not scheduled to appear on the agenda except for the last item. The matters were to receive background information and legal advice concerning a potential intergovernmental agreement, to receive attorney client

privileged legal advice involving potential agreements to extend City services and utilities for properties near the local airport, Heckle Boulevard, and I-77; to receive legal advice related to a litigation matter involving the City, and to consider Council appointments to City Boards and Commissions.

The City Council returned to Regular Session and Mayor Gettys reported that no action was taken.
